The East Asia Forum (EAF), supported by The Australian National University (ANU) College of Business and Economics, is pleased to invite the submissions of articles from Emerging Scholars for publication in a special edition of the *EAFQ*. *EAFQ* seeks submissions from up-and-coming scholars (35 years and younger) on the issue of ***Asia's economic and political challenges and how to deal with them***. Articles may address this subject from a regional, sub-regional, national, or thematic perspective. Selected articles will be published in the special edition of *EAFQ* and online.

The authors of submissions selected for publication will receive travel and expenses to attend a Roundtable of Emerging Scholars of Asia at the Australian National University, 12-14 July. The Roundtable will be held in conjunction with the [China Update](#) at the ANU.

In addition, the article judged best and the article which receives the largest number of unique hits on EAF will receive prizes of AU\$1,000.

The closing date for submissions is 5pm, 2 April, 2010.

Submission Requirements

- Submissions must include:
 - Article (.doc format)
 - Brief profile (see Appendix 1 for template)
 - Curriculum Vitae
- Articles must be less than 800 words.
- Entrants must be younger than 36 on June 1, 2010 (DOB before June 1, 1974).
 - If selected you will be required to provide proof of age (scan of id card, passport etc.)

Please ensure you have read all submission requirements as your submission will not be judged if these are not fulfilled.

Submissions must be emailed to editor@eastasiaforum.org by 5pm (AEST), 2 April, 2010.

Selection Criteria

Submissions will be judged on:

- Originality
- Relevance to topic
- Quality and clarity of writing
- Accuracy
- Insightfulness of analysis
